KUCHING: Three varsity students have "adopted" a local non-governmental organisation (NGO) as case study for their project.

Myrrah Shaima, Leong Lai San and Nur Ethika from Universiti Malaysia Sarawak (Unimas) recently met the Hope Place founder Kelvin Wan to know more about the body.

The three undergraduates even joined him to deliver food items to need families near Bau, about half-an-hour's drive from here.

"We visited Uncle Hee Jet Sin, 66, and his wife Voon Kim Siang, 63, who could not not walk after a fall recently.

"Their house did not have electricity and clean water supply."

"They had to rely on collected rainwater for drinking, cooking and cleaning," Kelvin said. Moreover Uncle Hee's house was located at quite a distance from the main road.

"The car could not reach there. We had to traverse through a small jungle from the main road, which roughly took us some 15 minutes to reach Uncle Hee's house.

"Even the road condition was bad, which I think could be worse during rainy season," he said.
