Childhood obesity a growing health concern in Malaysia

KUCHING: Childhood obesity has become a growing concern in the country due to the rapid economic development, lifestyle and changes in non-communicable diseases.

In Sarawak, studies indicate a prevalence of six to nine per cent of overweight and obesity among both urban and rural children, with a higher rate among boys.

According to a study carried out among primary school pupils in Kuching City, the prevalence of overweight and obesity was reported at 18.2 per cent and 15.2 per cent respectively, with the highest prevalence among Iban and Bidayuh children.

However, statistics on younger children among other major ethnic groups is comparatively fewer, although, there is an indication that such a trend is also found in rural Sarawak, particularly areas closer to towns.

The research titled 'Improving health energy balance – and obesity-related behaviours among pre-schools in Malaysia: Feasibility of adapting the ToyBox Study' was awarded a research grant from the Newton-Ungku Omar Fund.

Its co-researcher from Universiti Malaysia Sarawak (Unimas) Associate Professor Dr Cheah Whye Lian said the feasibility of adapting a kindergarten-based family-involved intervention programme from Europe to Malaysia was aimed at preventing early childhood obesity.

Cheah said the target groups would be teachers, children and parents who would have to inculcate healthier habits and

behaviours in terms of drinking, snacking, physical activities and sedentary behaviours.

"Such phenomenon is not uncommon as more and more children are indulged in sedentary lifestyle due to many factors," she said when met by reporters after paying a courtesy call on Unimas deputy vice-chancellor (Research and Innovation) Prof Dr Kopli Bujang recently.

The ToyBox project researchers comprise experts from Unimas, Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia (UKM), Roehampton University and Durham University in the United Kingdom.
