KEYNOTE SPEAKERS

Cecilia A. Essau (University of Roehampton, UK)



<u>Keynote</u>: Mitigating negative mental health and educational impacts of COVID-19 preventative measures

Cecilia Essau is Professor of Developmental Psychopathology and the Research lead for Applied Research and Assessment in Child and Adolescent Wellbeing at the University of Roehampton, UK.

She is also Visiting Professor at the University of Adelaide, and Scientific Advisor at the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime on the development and dissemination of a "Treatnet Family Intervention", an evidence-based training package for adolescents with drug use disorders.

Cecilia obtained her undergraduate and her Master of Arts degrees from Lakehead University (Canada), her PhD from the University of Konstanz (Germany), and her "Habilitation" in Psychology (qualification for tenure-track professorships in Germany) from the University of Bremen (Germany).

She is the first Iban woman to have received a PhD.

Professor Essau was awarded the Norman Munn Distinguished Visiting Scholar from Flinders University, Distinguished Visiting Professorship from De La Salle University, and the Florey Medical Research Foundation Mental Health Visiting Professorship from the University of Adelaide. In August 2019, she was Singapore's Ministry of Health HMDP (Health Manpower Development Plan) Visiting Expert in young children with emotional and/or behavioural problems. In 2011, she was made Fellow of the British Psychological Society in recognition of her contribution to the field of Psychology. She is also Fellow of the Japan Society for the Promotion of Science.

With fundings from numerous national and international research councils, her research focuses on understanding factors that can lead young people to have serious emotional and behavioural problems and using this research to (a) enhance the assessment of childhood and adolescent psychopathology and (b) design more effective interventions to prevent and treat such problems. She is the author/co-author of 300 articles and is the author/editor of 22 books in the area of youth mental health.

Deborah Riby (Durham University, UK)



Keynote: The impact of attention, arousal and anxiety in the classroom for autistic and neurodivergent pupils

Deborah Riby is Professor of Developmental Psychology and Associate Pro-Vice Chancellor for Postgraduate Research Students at Durham University. She is also Co-Director of the Centre for Neurodiversity and

Development interested in neurotypical development, neurodevelopmental conditions, and neurodiversity.

Her research predominantly focuses on Autism and Williams syndrome. She has used a variety of research approaches to understand areas of relative proficiency or challenge - exploring syndrome-specific signatures, cross-syndrome overlaps, and neurodiversity.

Professor Riby is also national Chair of the Developmental Psychology Section of the British Psychological Society and a member of the Professional Advisory Panel of the Williams Syndrome Foundation UK charity. As well as conducting her research on neurodevelopmental conditions, Debbie is the Director of the ESRC-funded North East and Northern Ireland Doctoral Training Partnership training social science doctoral researchers across 7 UK institutions.

Bee Koon Poh (Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia, MALAYSIA)



<u>Keynote</u>: Preventing overweight and obesity in preschoolers with a multi-component kindergarten-based behavioural intervention: ToyBox Study Malaysia

Bee Koon Poh is Professor of Nutrition at Faculty of Health Sciences, Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia. She has more than 20 years of research experience focusing on childhood and adolescent nutrition.

Professor Poh has led many international grants, including those funded by United Kingdom Medical Research Council, United Nations' International Atomic Energy Agency and International Development Research Centre. She is Principal Investigator of South East Asian Nutrition Surveys (SEANUTS) in Malaysia, and ToyBox Study Malaysia. Professor Poh is Editor-in-Chief of Malaysian Journal of Nutrition. She has won numerous awards, including International Nutrition Foundation—Ellison Medical Foundation Short Term Fellowship, and IAEA Nobel Peace Prize Fund Schools in Nutrition fellowship.

Victoria Leong Vik Ee (Nanyang Technological University, SINGAPORE)



<u>Keynote</u>: Neural sociometrics: Parent-infant neural social dynamics in early mental health and learning

Victoria Leong is a developmental cognitive neuroscientist who has pioneered the use of dyadic-EEG to study parent-infant neural synchrony during naturalistic social interactions.

Dr Leong is Associate Professor of Psychology and Medicine at Nanyang Technological University (Singapore), Senior Honorary Fellow with the Department of Pediatrics at Cambridge University (UK), and Deputy Director of the Cambridge-NTU Centre for Lifelong Individualised Learning which aims to develop

neuropersonalised training programes for flexible learning across the lifespan.

Dr Leong is a recipient of the Federation of Associations in Behavioral and Brain Sciences Early Career Impact Award (2022), Nanyang Research Award (2022), MOE Social Sciences and Humanities Research Fellowship (Singapore, 2021), Parke Davis Exchange Fellowship (Harvard, 2015), Sutasoma Junior Research Fellowship (Cambridge, 2013-15) and the Cognitive Science Society Glushko Dissertation Prize (2014). She holds multiple research awards from A*STAR, the Wellcome Trust, the British Academy, the UK Economic & Social Research Council, and the Rosetrees Medical Trust.

Paul Delfabbro (University of Adelaide, AUSTRALIA)



<u>Keynote</u>: Emerging digital technologies and young people: Understanding the risks and benefits of the increasing intersections between gaming, gambling and speculative investments

Paul Delfabbro is Professor of Psychology at the University of Adelaide, Australia. He graduated from the University of Adelaide with degrees in Arts, Commerce and Economics and a PhD in psychology.

Professor Delfabbro has published extensively in several areas, including the psychology of gambling, child protection and child welfare and applied cognition. He has over 400 publications in these areas including over 300 national and international refereed journal articles.

Professor Delfabbro has previously been rated in the top 1% of behavioural addictions researchers in the world by Thomson-Reuters in 2015 and has current interests in the intersection between gambling, gaming and blockchain technology and its psychological implications.

Shanaya Rathod (Southern Health NHS Foundation Trust, UK)



Keynote: Empowering youth: Celebrating culture and the art of cultural adaptation

Shanaya Rathod is a Consultant Psychiatrist, Southern Health NHS Foundation Trust and visiting Professor to the University of Portsmouth. Professor Rathod hosts a wellbeing channel on Youtube: @VideosByShanaya.

Following her postgraduate medical education, she completed a doctorate in medicine, Certificate course in Managing health services with the Institute of Health Care Management, acquired a certificate of Advance Medical leader with British Association of Medical Managers, Masters in Leadership and Coaching and Mentoring credential.

Professor Rathod has been a Fellow with the National Institute of Health and Care Excellence and the mental health clinical lead of the Wessex Academic Health Sciences Network and Wessex Clinical Research Network. She held the position of Director of Research for Southern Health NHS Foundation Trust from 2011 – 2022.

Professor Rathod has influenced national strategy through her leadership and research over the years and has held a number of leadership roles in the NHS in medical, research and clinical management. She has published books, book chapters, papers in peer reviewed journals and lectured extensively at national and international events.

Lara Farrell (Griffith University, AUSTRALIA)



<u>Keynote</u>: Treatment of obsessive-compulsive disorder (OCD) in children and adolescents: Improving access to care and child outcomes

Lara Farrell is a Clinical Psychologist and Professor within the School of Applied Psychology, and Deputy Director of the Centre for Mental Health, Griffith University, Gold Coast Campus.

Professor Farrell conducts clinical research in the field of childhood anxiety and obsessive-compulsive spectrum

disorders. Her work has involved numerous highly cited clinical trials for child anxiety/phobias and OCD, including group treatments, intensive treatments, digital and virtual reality interventions, and novel pharmacological augmentation of CBT.

Professor Farrell has particular interests in understanding predictors and moderators of treatment response. She has published more than 130 peer-reviewed papers and/or chapters in her field of research. She is Editor-In-Chief for Clinical Child and Family Psychology Review. She has also been a regular Panel Member for the NHMRC and MRFF Grant Review Panels. She has received funding for research from Griffith University, Australian Rotary Mental Health Research, Foundation for Children, Gold Coast Hospital Foundation, Brisbane Catholic Education, Australian Research Council (ARC) and National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) and the Medical Research Future Fund (MRFF). She oversees the "OCD Busters" and "Child Phobia" research treatment programs at Griffith University.

Umar Toseeb (University of York, UK)



<u>Keynote</u>: Genetic and environmental influences on mental health difficulties in young people with developmental language disorder

Umar Toseeb is a Senior Lecturer at the University of York in England where he leads the Child and Adolescent Neurodevelopmental Diversity (CANDY) research group.

Dr Toseeb's research focuses around the development of children and adolescents with neurodevelopmental conditions, specifically their mental health. Dr Toseeb primarily fits statistical models to existing longitudinal datasets. In doing so he is able to adopt a developmental approach informed by a range of disciplines such as genetics, sociology, speech and language therapy.

Anja Busse (United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime, AUSTRIA)



Keynote: Drug use disorders and related problems among young people

Anja Busse is a Programme Officer at the Prevention, Treatment and Rehabilitation Section of United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) since 2005, where she coordinates UNODC's global projects on treatment and care of drug use disorders, including the UNODC-WHO Programme on Drug Dependence Treatment and Care.

Her work includes technical assistance to UN Member States in their efforts to improve accessibility and quality

of services for people with drug use disorders in line with relevant international agreements. In the framework of the global projects, Anja has made key contributions or led the development and dissemination of internationally recognized technical tools such as the UNODC/WHO International Standards for the Treatment of Drug Use Disorders (2020) and related quality assurance tools, the UNODC/WHO handbook "Treatment and Care for People with drug use disorders in contact with the criminal justice system: Alternatives to conviction or punishment" (2019) or the UNODC Treatnet training materials on evidence-based drug use disorder treatment were developed. In the framework of the Treatnet strategy, Anja led the development of a capacity building package to address substance use and substance use disorders among adolescents, entitled "Treatnet Family — Elements of Elements of family therapy for the treatment of adolescents with drug and other substance use disorders including adolescents in contact with or at risk of contact with the criminal justice system", which by now has been implemented in more than 15 countries.

Anja is a Psychology graduate from the Freie Universitaet, Berlin and holds a Master of Public Health from the Medical School Hanover, Germany. She has been further trained in family therapy and in Media Pedagogics.

Jennifer Allen (University of Bath, UK)



<u>Keynote</u>: Antisocial behaviour and callous-unemotional traits in children and adolescents in the school setting

Jennifer Allen (PhD, Macquarie University) is a Reader in the Department of Psychology, University of Bath, where she is the Research Director on the professional doctorate in clinical psychology programme.

Her research investigates school and family influences in relation to child and adolescent mental health, and she has published over 50 journal articles, books, chapters, and assessment measures on these topics. Her work is designed to inform practitioners how to best support adults who children most rely on for their social and emotional well-being: their parents and teachers.

Dr Allen is an elected member of the Society for the Scientific Study of Psychopathy, serves on the editorial boards for the Journal of Child Psychology and Psychiatry and Research on Child and Adolescent Psychopathology, and recently won an award for her public engagement work in schools.

Janet Wong Yuen-Ha (Hong Kong Metropolitan University, HONG KONG)



<u>Keynote</u>: Implementing sexual health education: The journey of bridging the know-do gap

Janet Yuen-Ha Wong is Professor and Dean at the School of Nursing and Health Studies of Hong Kong Metropolitan University. Professor Wong obtained her professional qualifications and subsequently Doctor of Philosophy from The University of Hong Kong (HKU). During her PhD study, she was awarded the Fulbright Visiting Scholarship (2010-

2011) for her post-doctorate experience in the University of Virginia in the United States.

During her term of service in HKU, she steered the modernization of undergraduate and postgraduate programmes and led major curriculum reform exercises as the Chair of Teaching & Learning.

Professor Janet Wong is also a Fellow of Australasian College of Health Service Management, Hong Kong College of Health Service Executives and Fellow of American Academy of Nursing. She joined Pi lota Chapter, The Sigma Theta Tau of The International Honor Society of Nursing since 2013 and became the Asia Regional Coordinator in 2019-2023.

Her research area lies in health inequalities and vulnerabilities, including intimate partner violence, risky sexual behaviours, ethnic minority and sexual minority. Her research enhanced her capacity to know-how, fostered problem-solving skills, and disseminated nurse-driven innovations and evidence-informed practice to promote health. She is also committed to the innovation and scholarship of teaching and learning including high fidelity simulation, gamification, interprofessional education, virtual reality-based education, and robots. In both 2020 and 2021, she received the Teaching Innovation (Team) Awards in HKU, recognizing her dedicated efforts for excellence in teaching, for two consecutive years.

Susan H. Spence (Griffith University, AUSTRALIA)



<u>Keynote</u>: Depression and suicidal ideation and behaviour in adolescents

Susan H Spence is an Emeritus Professor in the Australian Institute for Suicide Research and Prevention at Griffith University and Honorary Professor at the University of Queensland. Her previous positions included Deputy Vice Chancellor (Academic) at Griffith University, Dean, Division of Linguistics and Psychology at Macquarie University, and Head of School of

Psychology and Professor at University of Queensland.

Her research focuses on the causes, assessment, prevention and treatment of anxiety and depression in young people. She has published widely in these areas and has received extensive national competitive grant funding to support her research. She was elected a Fellow of the Australian Psychological Society, British Psychological Society and the Academy of the Social Sciences in Australia. In 2016 she received the Honour of being appointed an Officer of the Order of Australia in recognition of her distinguished service to mental health research, particularly to prevention and treatment in young people and to tertiary education.

Professor Spence is the author of the Spence Children's Anxiety Scale, a measure that is widely used internationally and has been translated into over 20 languages. She was also one of the developers of BRAVE-ONLINE, an evidence-based internet-delivered treatment program for anxiety in children and adolescents.

Toh Teck Hock (SEGi University Sibu Clinical Campus & Sibu Hospital, MALAYSIA)



<u>Keynote</u>: Cross-cultural similarities and differences in reporting autistic symptoms in toddlers

Toh Teck Hock is a Paediatrician and the Head of Clinical Research Centre in Sibu Hospital, Sibu, Sarawak. He has worked in the UK, Singapore and Australia for numerous years as a paediatric trainee. Besides general paediatrics, he also works in the areas of developmental-behavioural paediatrics and community child health.

He is an Adjunct Professor for SEGi University Medical School as well as the Special Olympics Asia Pacific

Regional Clinical Advisor in Health Promotion®, Vice President for the National Early Childhood Intervention Council, Council Member for Sarawak State Council for Early Childhood Education and Development, National Assessor for the Baby-Friendly Hospital Initiative and Secretary of the Association for Children with Special Needs Sibu.

In addition to scientific papers, Professor Toh has published parent-teacher handbooks on ADHD and language development, children reading/colouring books, and books on Chinese literary prose/short stories. He is the recipient of The Outstanding Young Malaysian Award in 2010 for the Category "Contribution to Children, World Peace or Human Rights", Special Education Network in Asia Advocacy Award in 2018, and numerous other awards/prizes for academic/work achievement over the years.

Helen Dodd (University of Exeter, UK)



<u>Keynote</u>: The importance of play in supporting children's social and emotional wellbeing

Helen Dodd is a Professor of Child Psychology in the College of Medicine and Health (CMH), University of Exeter. She is an expert in child mental health with a particular interest in the development of childhood anxiety disorders. Her research has been funded by the ESRC, Royal Society, British Academy, Kavli Foundation and the Australian Research Council. She has received awards for her research from the Anxiety Disorders Association of America

(ADAA) and the British Psychological Society (BPS). Most recently she was awarded the Margaret Donaldson Award from the British Psychology Society for her outstanding contribution to developmental psychology.

Professor Dodd held an ESRC Future Research Leaders grant between 2014 and 2019 and currently holds a UKRI Future Leaders Fellowship, which funds a program of work examining the relationship between children's adventurous play and mental health. Helen regularly writes about children's play and contributes to public discussions about the role of play in supporting children's mental health. During the pandemic Helen played a leading role in the @playfirstUK group, who campaigned for children's play to be prioritised and for a #SummerOfPlay.

Alongside her work on adventurous play, Helen collaborates on a number of other projects which focus on better understanding pathways to anxiety in young children and how to support children and families to prevent mental health problems. She has expertise in longitudinal data analysis, eye tracking, observational research, experimental design and developmental psychology more broadly.

Beatrice Leong (Autism Inclusiveness Direct Action Group, MALAYSIA)



Experience-Sharing Lecture: Implementing sexual health education: The journey of bridging the know-do gap

After a lifetime of grappling with mental health challenges and faced with multiple misdiagnosis, Beatrice Leong was diagnosed with autism at the age of 35. This diagnosis and realisation brings a profound clarity to the lifelong struggles she had endured in trying to understand who she is as a human.

As a late-diagnosed autistic woman, Beatrice possesses a unique perspective and firsthand experience, allowing her to empathise with the complex challenges faced by girls and women seeking diagnosis and support. This experience had led Beatrice to be a founder of an autistic-led advocacy group, AIDA (Autism Inclusiveness Direct Action Group) to further champion inclusion and self-representation of the autistic community within the society, and lobbying autistics as an active participant in making policies that shape their lives.

A filmmaker and entrepreneur, Beatrice is driven by her insatiable curiosity and passion for new experiences and stories. An open book about her experiences, she now dedicates her life to reframing our understanding of autism, particularly in girls and women. She envisions a society that embraces differences and advocates for meaningful participation and inclusion of autistic individuals across all levels of society.

Caroline Donovan (Griffith University, AUSTRALIA)



Workshop: Treating sleep problems in children

Caroline Donovan is a Clinical Psychologist and Professor within the School of Applied Psychology and the Centre for Mental Health at Griffith University. Professor Donovan has full registration as a Psychologist with the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency (AHPRA) and is a member of the Australian Psychological Society and the APS College of Clinical Psychologists.

She has received over \$8.8 million worth of funding throughout her career and has published 13 book chapters and 95 peer reviewed journal articles. She as presented at numerous national and international conferences, is an Associate Editor of Anxiety, Stress and Coping, and is currently on the Editorial Boards of Child Psychiatry and Human Development and Australian Psychologist.

In addition to supervising PhD/DPsych students, Professor Donovan has a small private practice that she runs through the Griffith University Psychology Clinic. Her research philosophy centres around a strong belief in early intervention and its ability to change the otherwise problematic trajectories of youth with mental health disorders. Her interests lie in youth anxiety, depression, sleep and body image issues, with a strong emphasis on digital mental health interventions to increase reach and access to evidence-based psychological interventions for young people.

Deborah Riby is Professor of Developmental Psychology and Associate Pro-Vice Chancellor for Postgraduate Research Students at Durham University. Professor Riby's research predominantly focuses on Autism and Williams syndrome. She has used a variety of research approaches to understand areas of relative proficiency or challenge - exploring syndrome-specific signatures, cross-syndrome overlaps, and neurodiversity.

Priscilla Ho (Creativity At Heart Penang, MALAYSIA)

She received the 2016 Merdeka Thumbs Up Award for advocating and leading the antibullying program: 'Be a Buddy not a Bully' in Penang. She was a speaker at TEDx Weld Quay (2014).

Priscilla inspires young people to identify their strengths, heal and empower themselves in the journey together with her. Never to put oneself down! Over the last 10 years her most meaningful works are with children chronically-ill, traumatized children in children-homes and remanded youths in juvenile home/reform school to reclaim their future.

She is the master trainer for Super Skills of Life (SSL) programme in Malaysia and trained more than 500 educators and community volunteers in implementing SSL and has implemented SSL to over 1500 children and adolescents in Penang.

She published a therapeutic activity book "I am Special", to help children who are traumatized, abused and neglected to express their thoughts and feelings (healing themselves from brokenness to wholeness).

Bilge Uzun (Bahçeşehir Üniversitesi, TURKEY)

Bilge Uzun is Professor at the Department of Psychological Counselling and Guidance, Bahcesehir University, Turkey. Mental health portal: The student's psychoemotional support

Background: The prevalence of students' mental health problems has increased in recent years. The digitalization of mental health care has made it possible to connect with students in new ways, hence, more focus has been placed on mental health portals. However, the usability of the portal is crucial to ensure that it meets the student's needs and expectations.

Aims: Therefore, this study aims to develop a mental health portal using Rapid Application Development (RAD), and subsequently to evaluate its usability.

Methods: Heuristic Evaluation and System Usability Scale (SUS) were conducted to assess the expert's and 189 students' experience in manoeuvring the portal, respectively. Design and content improvisation were made based on the expert's insight.

Results: The portal's usability score was 71.11, which indicates good usability. A score above 70 indicates high usability, whereas a score below 70 indicates poor usability and requires further improvement. The results of this study offer the first evidence about the usability of the mental health portal but there is still potential for advancement.

Conclusions: In conclusion, developing an engagement-enhancing mental health portal is essential. The portal should strive to consolidate and present resources in a navigable and accessible manner to suit the needs and expectations of students seeking mental health support.
