Varsity turns 72 grads into technopreneurs this year

KUCHING: In their pursuit to produce business-minded, tech-savvy entrepreneurs in various fields of study in the university, Universiti Malaysia Sarawak (UNIMAS) has successfully created 72 graduates as technopreneurs this year; an increase from 45 last year.
